Matraville Precinct Meeting 10 July 2017

Thank you for the minutes of this meeting of the Matraville Precinct. The Council notes the contents of these minutes, and I am able to provide you with the following information in response to resolutions of the meeting.

Resolution 10072017(1):

- RMS has approved the 3.5t Load Limit along Perry Street
- The signage has been ordered and received
- Notification letters to Residents and Business Operators will be distributed by 11 August 2017
- Signage will be installed by the end of August

Resolution 10072017(2):

Council's Director Governance and Financial Services, Mr Jeff Smith is meeting with Orora on 11 August and the Precinct will be updated following the meeting.

Resolution 10072017(3):

This matter is being managed by Council's Works team. Council will update the precinct as soon as possible.

Resolution 10072017(4):

Council's Manager of Integrated Transport will be writing to the respective Council's advising of them of the DA conditions relating to the Veolia site and informing them of the soon to be installed Perry Street Load limit restrictions. A copy of the letter will be provided to the Precinct ASAP.

Resolution 10072017(5):

The Precincts request was sent to Council's Rangers who will undertake daily patrols at midday.

Resolution 10072017(6):

Linking the Coastal Walkway along the entire length of the Randwick local government area has been a long term vision of the Council. The Coastal walkway is one of our most valuable recreational facilities. The section between South Maroubra Beach and Pioneers Park is a critical section.

The design development of the section (western walking track) currently being constructed by Randwick City Council was developed prior to the area becoming a national park. Originally Council was prepared to construct this section under an arrangement with the Commonwealth Government as they were the owners of the land. When the land was transferred to NSW as national park the project continued.

NSW National Parks Service is currently developing a walkway on the eastern edge of Malabar Headland National Park but this is much longer and more like a bush walk than the Western Walking Track.

Randwick City Council frequently works on projects with the NSW National Parks Service and this is a further example of the community benefit that can be gained from interagency cooperation.

As with all major capital works projects the project was supported by the Councillors and included in the annual capital works budget.
