As the Precinct would be aware Council has expended substantial funds on the upgrade of the pocket park on the corner of Carrington and Clovelly Road. This project will commence early next year. Additionally, we are undergoing a process to deliver improvements at the corner of Burnie Ave and Clovelly Road. Both these projects are included in the Clovelly Road Masterplan.

Resolution 13112023(3): The Clovelly Precinct Committee seeks the expert advice from the Randwick Traffic Committee, on what options are available to minimise the use by permanently parked vehicles of this important parking resource. One option may be restricted parking that prohibits extended day stay. The current arrangement that exists in Burnie Street adjacent to Burnie Park is an example of what could be considered.



Council response:

This matter has been referred to Council's Rangers for investigation. Often such investigations can reveal numbers of unregistered trailers / vehicles in an area. If so, the last registered owners of these vehicles and trailers would be posted a penalty notice and the trailers / vehicles would be further investigated as suspected abandoned vehicles.

With regard to any registered trailers, observed to be parked legally, Council's Rangers would make a determination whether to further investigate them, as unattended items, under the Public Spaces Unattended Property Act 2021.

Resolution 13112023(6): The Council return the bins to their place in Gordons Bay - garbage bins at Gordons Bay were removed and replaced with wooden logs - the precinct believes this would have an adverse impact on the cleanliness and aesthetic appearance of the area.

Council response:

There have been several injuries acquired by staff when hauling waste bins located near the fishing club-house at Gordons Bay. One extremely hot new years' day a staff member hauled over 30 bin loads of rubbish up the hill. In an effort to overcome these issues, Council applied for and received a litter grant from the EPA (Environment Protection Authority) in July 2023.

Part of the grant is to be used for installing bin stations at either end of the Gordons Bay walk. There will be two waste and two recycling bins cages at the Victory Street end and two waste and one recycling bin cage at the Major Street end of the walk. These should be installed before 24 December 2023.

We will be encouraging visitors to Gordons Bay, through a communication campaign "Love where you live," during the summer of 2023/24 to walk their rubbish to the bins where they can be safely and more easily lifted into trucks.

In addition to newly installed bins, Council developed and has ordered public place waste and recycling signage to go on the bin cages to have users' "stream" their rubbish appropriately. Ends of bin stations will have either "Love where you Live" signage or "Love this scene? Keep it Clean" signage installed.

As part of the communications campaign, a graffitied and unsightly sewer pumping station near the Victory Street end of the walk is to have a makeover by a mural artist with an anti-littering artwork "Bin it for Bluey." The artwork which features a blue grouper and a large octopus swimming among litter is designed to catch the eye of passersby and message to them the connection between what they do on the land and what happens in the sea. The artwork will begin in the second week of January and take approximately two weeks and it is anticipated there will be social media anti-littering messaging around the creation of the artwork.

The Gordon's Bay fishing club has been informed of these activities.

The Ranger team throughout summer will be deployed to provide education and regulatory visits to the area and to reinforce messages in the communications campaign.

Resolution 13112023(7): The Clovelly Precinct request the Traffic Committee considers options for ensuring that large vehicles are unable to obstruct the view of drivers leaving the Clovelly Road petrol station when they have to turn right.



Council response:

The Council does not impose parking controls to limit the parking of specific types of vehicles adjacent to driveways. However, a review of 3 years of aerial photos shows that the subject trailer, shown in your image above, has not been moved since about December 2020. Accordingly, the matter has been referred to Council's Ranger Services to investigate:

• If the trailer has current registration

 If action could be undertaken, regarding this trailer, under the Public Spaces (Unattended Property) Act
