## Meeting of the Mayors

In an historic moment, all three of Randwick's female Mayors – two former and one current – enjoyed time together to celebrate women in local councils. Councillor Lindsay Shurey (who was Mayor from 2017-18) and Mayor Kathy Neilson met to present Randwick's first female Mayor Margaret Martin (who wore the Mayoral chains from 1992-93) with a certificate to honour the one hundred year anniversary since NSW Parliament passed the Women's Legal Status Act. This Act allowed women to practise as lawyers, become Justices of the Peace and stand for election to Local Government and the Legislative Assembly.



## Wheelchair matting

Malabar Beach has become the first beach in Sydney with permanent wheelchair matting as part of a project by Randwick City Council, the Lions Club and the Rainbow Club Australia.

The 60-metre long specially designed mat has been installed over the sand providing easier access for wheelchair users to reach the water's edge. The matting is a permanent fixture available seven days a week, 365 days a year.

Malabar Beach was chosen for the project given its protection from ocean swell and relative calmness. Meaning the matting can be kept in place all year. The beach is also home to an ocean pool that is fully wheelchair accessible.



## Smart rubbish bins

Smart public litter bins that compact waste using solar power and send alerts when they are full have been installed at La Perouse as part of a Randwick City Council trial program. The smart bins can hold up to eight times the volume of a normal public litter bin due to their internal compaction technology. This new technology has already seen improved efficiencies and cost savings.

## Malabar Junction toilets

We'll soon be seeking feedback on proposed improvements to the Malabar Junction toilets and surrounding area. The brown brick toilet block hasn't had an upgrade since the 80s and we think it's time to give it – and the area around it – a bit of love. ## Mattress collection

A dedicated mattress collection and recycling team is collecting unwanted mattresses across Randwick City as part of Council's free household clean-up service. More than 300 mattresses are collected each month and sent to a recycling centre where the mattresses are either refurbished or the material is extracted for recycling. The dedicated Council team is the latest evolution in Randwick Council's free mattress collection service which launched in 2013. ## Coogee Bay Road upgrade continues

Council recommenced work on the Coogee Bay Road upgrade at the beginning of March. Improvements include underground power, wider footpaths, more street trees, the construction of kerb and guttering, paving, electrical works, road reconstruction, line marking, signage installation, minor landscaping and street furniture installation. The new look Coogee Bay Road will be completed by the end of 2019. We're sure you'll enjoy the new wider paths, outdoor dining options and fresh landscaping.



## Designs reviewed to save trees

In September 2018 we approached the community with some options for walking and cycling improvements between South Coogee with Kingsford. We received feedback that residents were keen to retain as many trees as possible. As a result, Council has committed to reviewing the design to save trees and review the feasibility of other routes.

The proposed 1.9km separated cycleway and streetscape upgrade along Bundock and Sturt Streets will link up with the light rail terminal at Kingsford and connect with another proposed cycleway to continue north along Houston Rd and Doncaster Ave to Centennial Park and on to the city.

Retention of trees and increasing the tree canopy in Randwick is important to Council. We have engaged an independent arborist to assess each tree proposed for removal so we can consider health, species, age and significance. This information will be presented to the community for further consultation.



## Cape Banks Walking Track opening soon!

Construction on a new section of the coastal walkway, from Cape Banks Road through the NSW Golf Course to the Henry Head Walking Track in the Kamay Botany Bay National Park will soon be completed and open to the public.

This new formalised walking track opens up a whole new section of our coast to walkers to enjoy safely without impacting on golfers. The track includes a concrete path, lowered by one metre, with raised landscaped mounds on either side to protect walkers travelling across the golf course. We've also installed a mesh boardwalk over a section of wetland.

### Council protests the demolition of Sydney Football Stadium

Randwick Council joined Waverley and City of Sydney councils in calling on the State Government to immediately suspend all demolition work on the Sydney Football Stadium. Council considered five sets of legal advice at a meeting, examining the Government's approval process and found concerns with the validity of the consent. The legal advice says the Government may have failed to adequately consider design excellence provisions as required by the relevant planning legislation.

### Council tackles hoon behaviour

CCTV and a gate has been installed at Yarra Bay Sailing Club by Council to help La Perouse and Phillip Bay residents affected by car hoons visiting the area at night. The latest measures are part of an ongoing program by Council and local police to reduce anti-social behaviour and dangerous driving. Other measures implemented by Council include temporary traffic calming with water-filled barriers, the narrowing of roads to one lane, speed humps and parking restrictions. We'll be seeking feedback from residents soon on the effectiveness of the changes.

### Blak Markets

Keep an eye on the Blak Markets as they plan to grow and extend the popular event over the next 18 months. Council is partnering with the markets and will support their growth by contributing \$45,000 in funding for the six markets. The markets are held quarterly on Bare Island, La Perouse and allow visitors to buy original and affordable Aboriginal artworks, handicrafts, homewares and jewellery, and participate in unique cultural experiences.



### New courts now open

Heffron Park in Maroubra is now home to two new handball courts, which cater for both one-wall and three-wall games, and a new half basketball court on the western side of the park adjacent to Bunnerong Road. The new courts will add to the already diverse sporting opportunities available at the popular park.

### Support for Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service

Ocean safety for swimmers and rock fishers is at the heart of a community partnership agreement between Randwick City Council and the Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopter Service, which will include a donation of \$20,000 per year for the next three years.

In addition, the Community Partnership Agreement includes the opportunity for Randwick Council Lifeguards to attend accredited Helicopter Underwater Escape Training courses annually.



### Footpaths monitored by quad bikes

Randwick City Council recently used quad bikes with cameras and GPS tracking to systematically assess the condition of all local footpaths and shared access ways. The vehicles roamed the 525 kilometres of footpaths within the Randwick City local government area in order to create accurate records of path conditions and to prioritise future upgrades and repairs. Randwick Council spends \$1.7 million each year to repair and renew footpaths. The data gained from the quad bikes will assist Council to effectively prioritise the areas that need attention.

### Fighting against bus route woes

West Kensington residents face the prospect of losing direct access to the Sydney CBD. Changes to two bus routes, 302 and 303, will mean passengers are taken to Redfern station and will need to catch a train into the city, adding an additional 30 minutes to travel time. Council has written to the NSW Minister for Transport,

the Hon. Andrew Constance, The NSW Shadow Minister for Transport, Ms Jodi McKay, Mr Ron Hoenig MP, Member for Heffron and The Greens Transport Spokesperson, Ms Cate Faehrmann requesting that the 302 and 303 continue to the CBD as per their original routes, and with an increased frequency.

### IPART to consider levy application

Randwick Council has lodged an application with the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal to continue the Environmental Levy for a further five years. The levy has been in place for 15 years and has funded extensions to the Coastal Walkway, gross pollutant traps, solar panels, water recycling and community education programs. A decision is expected in May.

### Your say on Yarra Bay amenities

Randwick Council is proposing to upgrade the existing amenities building at Yarra Bay to meet current building standards and provide access for people with a disability. The works will create more inviting, safe and usable facilities for locals and visitors to the beach. The project is part of Council's Our Community Our Future program. # More than just books!


## Did you know you can access our libraries without walking into the building? Here's how to download, stream and borrow all from your very own smart device.

Our libraries are a huge part of our community. With courses and events for every age group, the libraries are a brilliant resource and wonderful way for the community to come together. Yet in our busy world, it can be hard to find time to get to the library, which is why our library can be accessed from your own home. For those who can't make it through the doors, we've been working on improving and enlarging our eResources. Here's what you need to know to enjoy our library from your very own smart device.



### Download our app

If you haven't downloaded our app, it's the first place to start. The library app is the key to being able to seamlessly search for and download ebooks, eaudiobooks, tv shows and films. Plus, you can place books on hold, reserve a PC and manage your account. Additionally, you can search our catalogue, (which includes books, toys, games, ebooks, eaudiobooks, films and magazines) from the app. The app can also store your library card information, so you can borrow a book without your card.



### Ebooks & audio books

We use a variety of e-resource providers to offer you numerous options to choose from. The best way to find what you're looking for is to search our catalogue using the myLibrary app. If you start your search within the app, you'll be presented with all the options and formats available, regardless of the provider.

Once you've found an ebook or eaudiobook you'd like to read or listen to, (and there are thousands to choose from!), all you need to do is download it from the particular app that will provide you with the e-copy of the book.

Our library has partnered with a number of ebook and eaudiobook providers – you can find the list at [www.randwick.nsw.gov.au/library/elibrary/ebooks](http://www.randwick.nsw.gov.au/library/elibrary/ebooks). The catalogue search within the myLibrary app will prompt you to install the appropriate resource provider's app, if you don't already have it installed on your device. If you do have it on your device, you'll be able to download and start reading or listening with one click or tap within the myLibrary app.

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Downloads are free for members and will automatically expire at the end of the loan or 'checked out' period

and do not need to be 'returned' or 'checked back in', which means you'll never receive a fine for 'checked out' ebooks or eaudiobooks!

### Films, documentaries & series

As a member of our library, you're also entitled to stream over 30,000 films and documentaries from Australia and around the world. Just download the Kanopy app, which features classic and contemporary films as well as anime, pop culture and more. Signing in is easy with your library card number and pin.

Keep in mind, these services are all free and provided with your free Randwick City library membership. If you need help setting up your accounts, our librarians are happy to help answer your questions.



## How to get started

- 1 Join the library.
- 2 Download the Randwick Library App.
- 3 Search the app for the book, movie or show you like.
- 4 Click on it to download.
- 5 If you need an additional app to access the book, movie or show, the myLibrary app will prompt you to download it.
- 6 All borrowed items will appear in your "checked-out items" on your Randwick library app.

# 10 things to do in Randwick City this autumn

**Summer beach days may be behind us, but fortunately there's still plenty of fun to be had right here in Randwick City.**

## 1. Play ball

We've just installed one new half-court basketball court and two new handball courts at Heffron Park, off Bunnerong Road, via Flint Street. Drop by and get your game on! Or use courts at Woomera reserve, Corel Sea Park or Kensington Park.



## 2. Whale watch

We recently finished remediation work at Jack Vanny Reserve, located in north Maroubra. The newly installed grass provides the perfect spot to toss a rug and enjoy the scenery.



## 3. Go for a swim

If the weather isn't warm enough for a dip at the beach, pop into Des Renford Leisure Centre to use one of their indoor pools. Or try the aqua aerobics class, which is held Monday – Friday at 8am.

## 4. Visit Randwick Environment Park

Enjoy a stroll through our 13 hectares of parkland, bushland and wetlands, which replenish and retreat depending on rainfall. Enjoy the birdlife, see the native bees and check out the vertical gardens, which have been installed near the community centre.

## 5. Have a hit of tennis

There are plenty of tennis courts for hire throughout Randwick City, but there are two courts in Baker Park at Coogee that are free of charge to use for one hour at a time. Keep in mind you may need to wait for a game, especially during popular times.



## 6. Enjoy our Western Walking Track

There's nothing like a brisk walk in the morning or evening to start and finish your day off right! Our Malabar Headland Western Walking track is a 1km track that connects Maroubra Beach to Malabar Beach.

## 7. Check out the library

If it's been a while since you've set foot inside a library, you might want to check one out. We've got three in Randwick City and they're all bustling with various activities and events. Events are often free and targeted at all ages. An autumn must-do!



## 8. Visit our Recycling Centre

If you haven't visited our Recycling Centre, pop by and check out all of the different household items we can recycle for you. From clothing (we'll donate it on your behalf), to x-rays, to soft plastics, to e-waste, we can ensure it's disposed of thoughtfully.



## 10. La Perouse Museum

Located at "The Loop" at La Perouse, the museum is home to around 2000 items across several rooms and exhibits. With a variety of exhibitions planned throughout the year, there's plenty to do and see. Check website for hours.

## 9. Remember the Anzacs

Join us for our Anzac Day Dawn Service at Coogee Beach on Thursday 25 April. No better location for such a moving, memorable occasion.

# Where would **we** **bee** without them?

**As the world's bee population plummets, Randwick Community Centre aims to be the sweet spot for the insects responsible for most of our food production. Carmen Rotolo stops to smell the roses.**

It's estimated that bees are responsible for a third of the food that we eat. Thanks to their valuable pollination service, we get to enjoy the sweeter things in life like blueberries, flowers, chocolate and coffee. They're simply the bee's knees! But all around the world there have been studies that show bees are buzzing off. Pesticides, disease, poor nutrition, habitat loss and parasites are some of the biggest catalysts behind their disappearance.

However, in the little pocket of paradise that is the Randwick Community Centre, one can feel a little more hopeful about the future of our bees. As Randwick City Council's Sustainability Manager, Peter Maganov, walks me around The Community Centre I can't help but think that this place must be a bee's Willy Wonka factory. The paths are lined with an array of bright, fragrant flowers which are perfect sweet treats for the six stingless native and two honey bee colonies that live here. There's echinacea, lavender, sarsaparilla, Guinea flower and nearby, dozens of busy bees grabbing what they need to take back home. "We are completely pesticide and chemical free here. We don't even use chemicals to clean the grounds so that we can create a completely natural environment for our bees. It's a little extra work, because we have to be very proactive with weeds but it's definitely worth it."

It's a thriving bee community that has been nurtured by Randwick City Council and The Sydney Bee Club. The joint operation aims to increase the number of native bee colonies in our area. While the European honey bee is a fantastic pollinator, high numbers of honey bees can actively harm wild bee populations as the two compete for nectar and pollen. At The Randwick Community Centre, the two species live harmoniously side by side which is a huge success for a centre so close to

the city. If you are thinking of getting a hive of your own or simply want to attract more bees into your garden, attend one of the Community Centre's workshops or have a walk through the gardens.



You might not even know you have native bees in your garden. They look like small bush flies and best of all, they won't sting you! You won't be able to collect their honey as they rely on their small stock for the colder months, but they will do a sweet job of pollinating your plants. If you want to encourage more of them in your backyard here's a few things you can do:

- Avoid using pesticides
- Make a wooden bee hotel with small holes for them to nest in
- Plant their favourites (bottlebrush, daisies, lavender)
- Grow a variety of flowers that bloom throughout the year
- Create a shallow bee bath filled with pebbles to help them stay hydrated
- Cut back on mulch

## Don't dump. Donate.

Charity bins around Sydney have been overflowing since Christmas and it may be due to the influence of a certain decluttering guru encouraging people to throw out items that no longer 'spark joy'. Under the influence of Japanese author and organising consultant Marie Kondo and the post-Christmas clean out, donation bins have become dumping grounds for unwanted clothes, books and knick knacks.

While the urge to purge is understandable, leaving bags of items at the base of donation bins is littering and renders the items unusable for charities, meaning they have to find ways to dispose of them. The best way to avoid this is to take donations straight into the charity store and make sure they have capacity to take them on.

If the charity can't use the clothing and bedding you no longer require, bring them to the Randwick Recycling Centre in Matraville instead. We now accept shoes, belts, scarves, hats, handbags and accessories, as well as manchester such as bedsheets, bedspreads, blankets and towels. Items such as pillows and cushions can't currently be accepted, though.



Wearable items will be sent to a charity, while damaged items will be sent to developing countries where they will be repaired and sold to the community at reasonable prices.

If, in your decluttering spree, you also come across some old x-rays from that time you sprained your ankle, we have good news for you, too. The Recycling Centre accepts old x-ray films. These films contain a silver in the form of halides, which can be extracted and used again.

Getting rid of stuff you no longer need will spark even more joy if you remember to dispose of the items in a responsible way, so keep the Recycling Centre in mind!
