ANZAC PARADE



Anzac Parade was named in 1917 as a memorial avenue to honour the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps that served at Gallipoli. The thoroughfare connects the Anzac Memorial Obelisk at Moore Park and La Perouse.

The route had evolved from a network of ancient Gadigal pathways and became a place of military training and parade.

By 1917, it linked many military sites including recruitment and training depots, rifle ranges, hospitals, rehabilitation facilities and housing for war widows.
